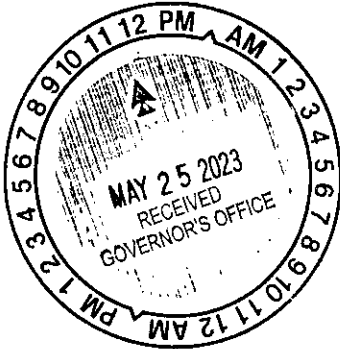

1 Enrolled, An Act,

2

3 To make supplemental appropriations for the fiscal year
4 ending September 30, 2023, from the Education Trust Fund to
5 various agencies and entities in a total amount of
6 \$2,787,667,309.

7 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF ALABAMA:

8 Section 1. In addition to all other appropriations
9 heretofore or hereafter made, there is hereby appropriated a
10 total of \$2,787,667,309 from the Education Trust Fund to the
11 following agencies and entities for the purposes specified
12 below for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2023:

13 (1) To the Department of Revenue - Refundable Tax Credit
14 Fund for income tax rebates, \$393,000,000, in accordance with
15 HB175/SB86 of the 2023 Regular Session.

16 (2) To Debt Service, to satisfy the remaining debt
17 service obligation on PSCA Bonds, Series 2012-B and 2013-C,
18 \$18,552,126.

19 (3) To the Department of Finance, Division of Risk
20 Management, for the State Insurance Fund, \$10,000,000.

21 (4) To the State Board of Education - Local Boards of
22 Education, \$64,134,584. Of this amount, \$23,673,683 shall be
23 used for the Foundation Program Salary Matrix; \$20,000,000
24 shall be distributed to systems that demonstrate the highest
25 need for fleet renewal, taking into consideration the age and
26 mileage of eligible buses and the number of eligible buses that
27 run morning and afternoon routes, as recommended by the State
28 Superintendent of Education and approved by the Governor; and

29 \$20,460,901 shall be used to pre-fund one-half of the state
30 cost of student materials for the 2023-2024 school year to
31 allow the funds to be utilized by teachers when the school year
32 begins, of which 100% shall be used for in-classroom expenses.

33 (5) To the State Department of Education for one-time
34 expenses, \$480,037,503. Of this amount, \$8,000,000 shall be
35 used for the American Village, of which, \$7,000,000 shall be
36 used for one-time capital expenditures for Independence Hall,
37 and \$1,000,000 shall be used for the Troy University Civics
38 Education Partnership. Of this amount, \$360,000,000 shall be
39 used as needed by school systems to help offset inflationary
40 increases in capital project and equipment costs initiated with
41 2020 PSCA bond funds, for school resource officers, insurance,
42 or other uses allowed with the Advancement and Technology Fund
43 pursuant to Section 29-9-4, Code of Alabama 1975, and
44 distributed on a pro rata basis based upon each system's
45 allocation in the 2020 PSCA bond issue, except where otherwise
46 provided in this act; \$10,000,000 shall be distributed to the
47 several existing Charter Schools on a per pupil basis;
48 \$10,000,000 shall be used for College and Career Readiness
49 grants; \$24,000,000 shall be used for summer math camps;
50 \$40,000,000 shall be used for school safety grants; \$5,000,000
51 shall be used for Junior Achievement of Alabama located in
52 Birmingham, all of which shall be expended for capital needs,
53 not to exceed 50% of the capital budget; \$200,000 shall be used
54 for one-time expenses for the Alabama Holocaust Commission;
55 \$2,237,503 shall be used for Ed Farm; \$200,000 shall be used
56 for the McWane Center STEM education programs; \$1,000,000 shall

57 be used for the Children Trust Fund for one-time software
58 expenses; \$1,750,000 shall be used for Selma elementary schools
59 tornado reconstruction expenses; \$250,000 shall be used for the
60 Alabama Symphony Orchestra; \$100,000 shall be used for Mobile
61 County Schools cerebral palsy services; \$300,000 shall be used
62 for Woolley Institute for Spoken Language Education for
63 children's hearing services; and \$17,000,000 shall be used for
64 the Saban Discovery Center. The Saban Discovery Center will be
65 an innovative hub for local and regional school districts to
66 educate and inspire children to enter STEAM (science,
67 technology, engineering, arts and design, mathematics) related
68 fields by providing hands on immersive and interactive
69 activities in the state-of-the-art facility. As a condition of
70 receiving state funding the Center shall: provide educators
71 with unique opportunities for professional development related
72 to lessons designed by the Center and shared with schools;
73 provide a discount of 50% on full-price tickets to Alabama
74 school-aged children. The State Department of Education will
75 work with the Saban Center to ensure the development of
76 appropriate lesson plans, resources, visits, and professional
77 development for teachers. The Department may also include other
78 partners such as regional in-service centers. The Saban Center
79 will also play an important role with workforce development
80 through the Center's STEAM Academy which will have the capacity
81 to play an instrumental role in connecting industry leaders
82 with a pipeline of skilled employees.

83 (6) To the Alabama Fire Fighters Personnel Standards and
84 Education Commission/Alabama Fire College for one-time expenses



85 related to a training module to help mitigate electric vehicle
86 fires, \$200,000.

87 (7) To the Retirement Systems of Alabama for one-time
88 Covid-related expenditures for PEEHIP, \$59,179,185.

89 (8) To the Department of Commerce for one-time expenses,
90 \$111,625,000. Of this amount, \$18,000,000 shall be used for the
91 "Earth" Workforce and Innovation Center for rural workforce
92 preparation and innovation/economic development center;
93 \$15,000,000 shall be directed to the Lauderdale County
94 Commission for a hydroelectric workforce training center upon
95 demonstrating a minimum of ten percent (10%) private or other
96 funds for the cost of the project; \$30,000,000 shall be used
97 for an AIDT electric vehicle workforce training center;
98 \$125,000 shall be for AIDT, and \$8,500,000 shall be used for
99 the Challenger Learning Center. As a condition of receiving
100 state funding the Center must: demonstrate a minimum of ten
101 percent (10%) private or other funds for the cost of the
102 project; shall provide a discount of 50% on full-price tickets
103 to Alabama school-aged children; and shall not make a request
104 for additional state funding for 10 years after the receipt of
105 the initial state funding. In addition, \$40,000,000 shall be
106 expended to create and fund the Alabama Site Development Fund.
107 The fund shall be managed and controlled by the State
108 Industrial Development Authority and expended to provide grants
109 for the assessment of and subsequent development of sites.

110 (9) To the Alabama Innovation Fund for one-time
111 expenses, \$51,000,000. Of this amount, \$20,000,000 shall be
112 used for the Agricultural Center of Innovation upon



113 demonstrating a minimum of ten percent (10%) private or other
114 funds for the cost of the project; \$8,000,000 shall be used for
115 the Hudson Alpha Institute for Biotechnology's campus expansion
116 which will consist of greenhouses and learning labs for the
117 Hudson Alpha Center for Plant Science and Sustainable
118 Agriculture and the Global Headquarters of Discovery Life
119 Sciences; \$8,000,000 shall be used for the Southern Research
120 Institute Cystic Fibrosis Foundation Partnership; and
121 \$15,000,000 shall be used for improvements to outdoor
122 recreation areas as recommended by the Innovate Alabama Outdoor
123 Recreation Advisory Council in consultation with the Department
124 of Conservation and Natural Resources and approved by Innovate
125 Alabama. Of the amount for outdoor recreational areas, \$850,000
126 shall be used for a study on establishing a statewide trails
127 network by Jacksonville State University.

128 (10) To the Alabama School of Mathematics and Science
129 for one-time capital projects and deferred maintenance expenses
130 to facilities and property used by the school, \$6,000,000. The
131 school shall be ineligible for inflationary increases from the
132 Department of Education pursuant to subdivision (5) above.

133 (11) To the Alabama School of Fine Arts for one-time
134 capital projects and deferred maintenance expenses to
135 facilities and property used by the school, \$6,000,000. The
136 school shall be ineligible for inflationary increases from the
137 Department of Education pursuant to subdivision (5) above.

138 (12) To the Alabama School of Cyber Technology and
139 Engineering for one-time capital projects and deferred
140 maintenance expenses to facilities and property used by the

141 school, \$6,000,000. The school shall be ineligible for
142 inflationary increases from the Department of Education
143 pursuant to subdivision (5).

144 (13) To the Alabama Commission on Higher Education,
145 \$46,660,831. Of this amount, \$7,000,000 shall be transferred to
146 Tuskegee University without reduction for administrative
147 expenses for one-time expenses for deferred maintenance,
148 renovation of existing facilities, or expenses associated with
149 ongoing capital projects; \$1,000,000 shall be used for the
150 Forest Workforce Training Center; \$100,000 shall be used for
151 the Talent Retention Initiative Project; \$3,400,000 shall be
152 used for National Guard Educational Scholarships; \$5,000,000
153 shall be used for one-time capital expenses for the USS Alabama
154 Battleship; \$15,000,000 shall be used for Outcomes-Based
155 Funding for 4-year colleges and universities, and other upper
156 division institutions based on the February 2021 report from
157 the Alabama Workgroup on Outcomes-Based Funding; \$270,000 shall
158 be used for the Best and Brightest STEM Pilot Program pursuant
159 to the provisions of Act 2020-204; \$5,000,000 shall be used for
160 the Deferred Maintenance Program for HBCU colleges and
161 universities; \$4,500,000 shall be used for ReEngage, part of
162 the All in Alabama campaign; \$5,000,000 shall be used for the
163 Birmingham Zoo - Alabama Veterinary Teaching Hospital; and
164 \$390,831 shall be used for the Southern Museum of Flight.

165 (14) To the Department of Early Childhood Education for
166 classrooms in areas with waiting lists, \$4,134,315.

167 (15) To the Department of Rehabilitation Services,
168 \$2,300,000. Of this amount, \$300,000 shall be used for cerebral



169 palsy services, and \$2,000,000 shall be used for federal
170 matching funds.

171 (16) To Alabama A&M University for one-time expenses for
172 deferred maintenance, campus security, renovation of existing
173 facilities, or expenses associated with ongoing capital
174 projects, \$20,969,937.

175 (17) To Alabama State University for one-time expenses
176 for deferred maintenance, campus security, renovation of
177 existing, facilities, or expenses associated with any capital
178 projects, \$13,399,461.

179 (18) To the University of Alabama at Tuscaloosa for
180 one-time expenses, \$66,173,691. Of this amount, \$46,000,000
181 shall be used for the Center for High Performance Computing;
182 \$8,000,000 shall be used for the Saban Center; and \$12,173,691
183 shall be used for the National Training Center for Electric
184 Vehicle Infrastructure and Technology.

185 (19) To the University of Alabama at Birmingham for
186 one-time expenses, \$66,173,691. Of this amount, \$50,000,000
187 shall be used for significant expansion of the University's
188 Hospital Emergency Department and \$16,173,691 shall be used for
189 deferred maintenance, renovation of existing facilities, or
190 expenses associated with ongoing capital projects.

191 (20) To the University of Alabama at Huntsville,
192 \$29,287,652. Of this amount, \$19,287,652 shall be used for
193 one-time expenses for an Education and Advanced Training
194 Complex to effectively fill highly technical jobs in
195 engineering, cybersecurity, math, and science education; and
196 \$10,000,000 shall be used for the National Cyber Security



197 Center for Excellence.

198 (21) To Athens State University for one-time expenses,
199 \$7,358,853. Of this amount, \$1,000,000 shall be used for the
200 Hightower-Nazaretian House; \$4,000,000 shall be used for Brown
201 Hall; and \$2,358,853 shall be used for deferred maintenance,
202 renovation of existing facilities, or expenses associated with
203 ongoing capital projects.

204 (22) To Auburn University for one-time expenses,
205 \$66,173,691. Of this amount, \$20,000,000 shall be used for the
206 Brown-Kopel Lab build out/completion; \$37,998,691 shall be used
207 for deferred maintenance, renovation of existing facilities, or
208 expenses associated with ongoing capital projects; \$175,000
209 shall be used for the EAGLES program; \$5,000,000 shall be used
210 for the McCrary Institute; and \$3,000,000 shall be used for
211 the Applied Research Institute to be used for the SAFEnet Pilot
212 Program.

213 (23) To Auburn University at Montgomery for one-time
214 expenses for deferred maintenance, renovation of existing
215 facilities, or expenses associated with ongoing capital
216 projects, \$11,208,364.

217 (24) To Jacksonville State University for one-time
218 expenses, \$18,227,654. Of this amount, \$3,000,000 shall be used
219 for campus and pedestrian safety; \$6,446,640 shall be used to
220 pay unreimbursed insurance claims to the Education Trust Fund
221 Budget Stabilization Fund pursuant to Section 29-9-5(b) of the
222 Code of Alabama 1975, as amended by Act 2018-544; \$500,000
223 shall be used for Painted Rock Research Studies; and \$8,281,014
224 shall be used for deferred maintenance, renovation of existing



225 facilities, or expenses associated with ongoing capital
226 projects.

227 (25) To the University of Montevallo for one-time
228 expenses, \$6,541,737. Of this amount, \$3,500,000 shall be used
229 to replace underground wiring, and \$3,041,737 shall be used for
230 deferred maintenance, renovation of existing facilities, or
231 expenses associated with ongoing capital projects.

232 (26) To the University of North Alabama for one-time
233 expenses for deferred maintenance, renovation of existing
234 facilities, or expenses associated with ongoing capital
235 projects, \$17,670,803.

236 (27) To the University of South Alabama for one-time
237 expenses, \$39,173,054. Of this amount, \$7,000,000 shall be used
238 for equipment and renovation needs of the engineering and
239 science labs of the College of Engineering; \$1,000,000 for
240 health simulation equipment; \$1,400,000 for two ADA compliant
241 motorcoaches; \$23,785,749 shall be used for deferred
242 maintenance, renovation of existing facilities, or expenses
243 associated with ongoing capital projects; and \$5,987,305 shall
244 be used for the renovation and equipment needs of the JMB
245 classroom and rehearsal complex.

246 (28) To Troy University for one-time expenses,
247 \$33,546,233. Of this amount, \$15,000,000 shall be used for
248 completion of the nursing building and the Center for Materials
249 and Manufacturing Sciences building, and \$18,546,233 shall be
250 used for deferred maintenance, renovation of existing
251 facilities, or expenses associated with ongoing capital
252 projects.

253 (29) To the University of West Alabama for one-time
254 expenses, \$11,816,848. Of this amount, \$598,312 shall be used
255 for the concurrent 4-year ASN-BSN Program Option; \$335,700
256 shall be used for the Respiratory Therapy Program; \$339,900
257 shall be used for a new student recreation and fitness center;
258 \$929,565 shall be used for the Cahaba Biodiversity Center
259 Facilities Renovation; \$75,000 shall be used for one-time
260 technology needs of Selma University; \$787,500 shall be used
261 for the Black Belt Scholars Program providing middle and high
262 school student STEM, reading, coding, and robotics camps;
263 \$50,000 shall be used for the Black Belt Scholars Program -
264 Stillman College providing middle and high school student STEM,
265 reading, coding, and robotics camps in Tuscaloosa; and
266 \$8,700,871 shall be used for deferred maintenance, renovation
267 of existing facilities, or expenses associated with ongoing
268 capital projects.

269 (30) To the Alabama Community College System for
270 one-time expenses, \$486,437,500.

271 a. Of the above amount, \$103,000,000 shall be used for
272 the construction and/or equipping of facilities for inmate
273 education in state prison facilities. Of this amount,
274 \$100,000,000 shall be used to fund the construction and/or
275 equipping of educational facilities for inmate education,
276 programming and/or vocational education pursuant to the prison
277 modernization plan adopted by the Legislature in Act 2021-546,
278 codified at Section 14-2-1 et seq., Code of Alabama 1975.
279 Expenditure of these funds is conditioned on the approval of
280 the majority of the ACCS Board. In addition, \$3,000,000 shall



281 be used for an educational and programming building at the
282 Limestone Correctional facility.

283 b. \$30,000,000 shall be used for career tech facilities
284 and equipment upgrades.

285 c. \$5,000,000 shall be used for deferred maintenance,
286 renovation of existing facilities, or expenses associated with
287 ongoing capital projects.

288 d. \$1,000,000 shall be used for the Innovation Center -
289 Dunn University.

290 e. \$200,000 shall be used for the Credential Program
291 pursuant to SB175 of the 2023 Regular Session.

292 f. \$316,237,500 shall be used for expenses associated
293 with the following projects:

294 1. \$19,000,000 for Bevill State Community College. Of
295 this amount, \$3,500,000 shall be used for facility renovations
296 and equipment at the Sumiton campus; \$15,000,000 shall be used
297 for the Alabama Infrastructure Training Center and other
298 facility renovations at the Sumiton and Jasper campuses; and
299 \$500,000 shall be used for other facility renovations at the
300 Jasper campus.

301 2. \$21,000,000 for Bishop State Community College. Of
302 this amount, \$7,500,000 shall be used for aviation
303 infrastructure and \$1,000,000 shall be used for a project with
304 the Mobile Area Education Foundation.

305 3. \$20,000,000 for Coastal Alabama Community College. Of
306 this amount, \$7,500,000 shall be used for aviation
307 infrastructure.

308 4. \$20,200,000 for Calhoun Community College. Of this



309 amount, \$3,700,000 shall be used for digital design and
310 computer graphics/cyber workforce building renovations;
311 \$9,500,000 shall be used for the Arts Academy; and \$7,000,000
312 shall be used for the Workforce Training Center expansion
313 project.

314 5. \$10,000,000 for Central Alabama Community College for
315 renovations at the Alexander City and Childersburg campuses.

316 6. \$10,000,000 for Chattahoochee Valley Community
317 College to complete renovations of the Adams Administration and
318 Industry Training Center buildings.

319 7. \$12,000,000 for Drake State and Technical College's
320 Workforce Training Center.

321 8. \$15,000,000 for Enterprise State Community College's
322 Performing Arts Center and Workforce Training Center.

323 9. \$12,000,000 for Gadsden State Community College's
324 Advanced Manufacturing and Workforce Skills Training Center.

325 10. \$17,000,000 for Jefferson State Community College.
326 Of this amount, \$7,000,000 shall be used for the Trussville
327 Community Learning Center and \$10,000,000 shall be used for
328 workforce and renovation projects at the Jefferson campus.

329 11. \$10,000,000 for Lurleen B. Wallace for building
330 renovations at the Andalusia and Opp campuses.

331 12. \$10,000,000 for Lawson State Community College for
332 improvements at the Birmingham and Bessemer campuses.

333 13. \$7,500,000 for Marion Military Institute. Of this
334 amount, \$5,500,000 shall be used for renovations to student
335 dorms and \$2,000,000 for the Craig Field Flight Program.

336 14. \$15,000,000 for Northeast Alabama Community College.

337 Of this amount, \$8,000,000 shall be used for the Workforce
338 Training Center and \$7,000,000 shall be used for the
339 construction of a softball field complex.

340 15. \$20,000,000 for Northwest Shoals Community College.
341 Of this amount, \$17,000,000 shall be used for renovations to
342 the Phil Campbell campus; and \$3,000,000 shall be used for the
343 Lauderdale County Workforce Training Center.

344 16. \$10,000,000 for Reid State Technical College for
345 campus renovations and modernization.

346 17. \$12,000,000 for Shelton State Community College for
347 renovations and workforce modernization to the Martin and Fredd
348 campuses and renovations to the softball complex.

349 18. \$10,687,500 for Snead State Community College for
350 the purchase of the Albertville Aviation Center and necessary
351 equipment, renovations to the Technology building, and
352 inflationary cost increases for the Workforce Training Center.

353 19. \$10,000,000 for Southern Union State Community
354 College for the Auburn Aviation Center and renovations to the
355 Opelika and Valley campuses.

356 20. \$15,000,000 for Trenholm State Community College for
357 renovations to the Executive Park campus.

358 21. \$10,000,000 for Wallace Community College-Dothan's
359 Workforce Training Center.

360 22. \$15,850,000 for Wallace State Community
361 College-Hanceville. Of this amount, \$15,000,000 shall be used
362 for a new STEM Gateway Education Facility, and \$850,000 shall
363 be used for historic outdoor theater renovations in Winston
364 County.



365 23. \$4,000,000 for Wallace State Community
 366 College-Oneonta for the Blount County multi-purpose complex.

367 24. \$10,000,000 for Wallace Community College-Selma for
 368 inflationary cost increases to the Workforce Center in
 369 Demopolis and renovations to the Selma campus.

370 g. \$31,000,000 shall be used to establish the Alabama
 371 Centers for Rural Healthcare Opportunities, a collaboration
 372 between the community colleges, rural healthcare employers, and
 373 communities throughout the state designed to address dual
 374 enrollment healthcare pathways and meet rural healthcare
 375 employer needs for skilled labor. The first center shall be
 376 located in Demopolis and be a collaboration between Wallace
 377 State Community College-Selma and the counties of Dallas,
 378 Green, Hale, Perry, Marengo, Sumter, and Wilcox. A full list of
 379 community colleges where centers may be located and the
 380 counties served follows:

 418 one-time expenses for deferred maintenance, renovation of
 419 existing facilities, or expenses associated with ongoing
 420 capital projects, \$7,000,000.

421 (32) To the Alabama Space Science Exhibit Commission,
 422 \$5,500,000. Of this amount, \$5,000,000 shall be used for
 423 one-time expenses for deferred maintenance, renovation of
 424 existing facilities, or expenses associated with ongoing
 425 capital projects and \$500,000 shall be used for the At-Risk
 426 Student STEM/Space Outreach.

427 (33) To the Lieutenant Governor for the K-12 Capital
 428 Grant Program established by SB269 of the 2023 Regular Session

432 (34) To the Educational Television Commission for
433 one-time capital expenses related to establishing a tower in
434 west Alabama, \$2,500,000.

435 (35) To the Executive Commission on Community Services
436 Grants to be distributed pursuant to Section 29-2-123, Code of
437 Alabama 1975, \$23,009,596.

438 (36) To the Treasurer for the Distressed Higher
439 Education Schools loan program established by HB431 or SB278 of
440 the 2023 Regular Session, \$30,000,000.

441 (37) To the Historical Commission, \$6,075,000. Of this
442 amount, \$75,000 shall be used for the Jesse Owens Memorial, and
443 \$6,000,000 shall be used for the Operating Grant Program.
444 Preference for grants shall be given to any structure
445 constructed for government or public purposes prior to 1840
446 that is listed in the National Register of Historic Places and
447 that is owned by a local city, town, county government, or
448 non-profit organization, or any structure built before 1965
449 that is eligible for or listed in the National Register of
450 Historic Places that significantly contributed to the Civil
451 Rights Movement.

452 (38) To the Alabama Institute for the Deaf and Blind for
453 one-time capital expenses, \$8,000,000.

454 (39) To the Educational Opportunities Reserve Fund
455 established pursuant to SB101 of the 2023 Regular Session,
456 \$353,975,000.



457 (40) To the Department of Archives and History for
458 one-time support for museum upgrades and/or property purchases,
459 \$5,000,000.

460 (41) To the Legislative Services Agency to contract with
461 an out-of state entity to conduct a feasibility study regarding
462 the establishment of a high school residency program for the
463 fields of healthcare or healthcare services to meet the needs
464 of the rural areas of the state, including the feasibility of a
465 sight in the Black Belt, \$750,000. The Agency shall file a
