RICHARD SHELBY: UNITED STATES SENATOR FOR ALABAMA

enator Richard Shelby, Alabama's longest serving senator, has been an instrumental leader for our great state throughout his tenure in Congress.

Senator Shelby, currently serving his sixth term, was elected to the United States Senate in 1986 and is the chairman of the Senate Committee on Appropriations. He formerly served as chairman of the Senate Banking, Housing, and Urban Affairs

Tier II Teachers Deserve a Better Pension

labama has been struggling for years with a well-documented teacher shortage. For the past two years, concerned legislators and education associations have tried to pass legislation to improve Tier II retirement benefits to help with this shortage. Now, with the additional challenges that education employees face due to the COVID-19 pandemic and the lack of students going into the teaching profession, this situation will get worse.

Schools need all the tools necessary to make sure that they can find and keep great education employees. Improving Tier II retirement benefits is one of those tools. The proposed improvements can be made without large increases in costs to employers but would have a significant impact by allowing 30-year retirement and conversion of sick leave for retirement credit, both of which are essential to keeping teachers in the classroom.

Another critical improvement is to allow a member's beneficiary to receive a better benefit - Option 2 if the member dies while in active service. Currently, that teacher's beneficiary would receive Option 3. This can help retain retirement-eligible education employees that want to continue working but are worried about not being able to provide for their families if something happens to them prior to retirement. With the health uncertainties for many older employees, this change would be extremely important.

Local governments have already taken steps to make sure they can better recruit and retain their public employees. Last year, they were given the option to provide Tier I retirement benefits to Tier II members. So far, 350 cities, counties, and local boards have recognized the need to improve benefits and have elected this option.

We have an opportunity to help our schools, but we must discuss and identify our priorities for the next regular legislative session that begins in February 2021. Let your legislators know that we need change now to ensure that we can recruit and retain the best education employees. Our children deserve only the best education.

Ross Bridge in Hoover on The RTJ Golf Trail

he Ross Bridge golf course (18 holes) opened in 2005 as the 11th site on the RTJ Golf Trail. This course was combined with the existing 54 holes at Oxmoor Valley (2 miles away) and a new hotel for a 72-hole golf resort on the Trail. The Renaissance Birmingham Ross

Bridge Golf Resort & Spa's 6-story, 270room hotel resembles the Fairmont Banff Springs Resort in Alberta, Canada. It includes a conference center (14,000 sf), spa (12,000 sf), golf shop, pool complex, indoor pool/fitness, 2 restaurants, sports bar, and tennis courts. This resort is the cornerstone for the accompanying residential development in this 2,700-acre community in Southwest Birmingham.

The RSA partnered with U.S. Steel Realty (USS) in 1990 to develop the Oxmoor Valley site and with Daniel Corporation in 1998 to develop housing for seniors in Birmingham and Huntsville. In 2002, Dr. Bronner invited USS to partner with the RSA, Daniel Corporation, and city of Hoover for a world-class golf course, luxury hotel, and upscale residential near Shannon. This resulted in USS donating 328 acres to the RSA for the golf course and hotel complex, and 87 acres to the city of Hoover for a 3.7-mile parkway, elementary school, parks, performing arts center, and fire station. USS reserved 120

acres for a high school. Hoover financed the conference center and leased it to the RSA. Daniel Corporation began developing housing on the adjoining acres in 2003.

This 310-acre golf course opened as the 4th longest course in the world and is

considered the Crown Jewel of the Trail. Ten of the holes play along 2 man-made lakes connected by a waterfall stretching 800 ft between the 9th and 18th greens. There is also a state-of-the-art practice facility. The course was designed to host major golf tournaments with hillside viewing areas of multiple holes. Every 3-4 holes return to the centralized clubhouse for spectator comfort. The Regions Charity Classic (PGA Champions Tour) was hosted there from 2006 through 2010 with over 100,000 visitors each year and worldwide TV coverage.

The residential component was approved for 1,778 single-family and 600

multi-family homes. There are 13 neighborhoods with a range of home styles and prices, and 200 acres of parks with lakes, 5 miles of walking trails, streams, and swimming pools. Over 1,300 single-family and 490 multi-family units have been constructed along with a retail center.

RSA's financing for this community cemented partnerships with corporations and local governments which gave impetus for the subsequent residential and commercial development. The RSA promoted the resort with free publicity from RSAowned TV stations and newspapers along with marketing by SunBelt Golf and Marriott. Construction spending for the

hotel, golf course, and housing, and continued spending by residents and visitors has significantly increased employment and revenue in Jefferson County and its municipalities.

programs and opportunities. His name graces university buildings at many of the universities across Alabama which largely house engineering and science research.

For example, at UAB, the Richard C. and Annette N. Shelby Interdisciplinary Biomedical Research Building was constructed in 2002. Senator Shelby has been

instrumental in securing hundreds of millions of dollars for the groundbreaking and life changing biomedical research that takes place in this 340,000 square foot facility.

Alabama Success Stories

Alabama's Gold Star Families Memorial Monument

t is hard to know what to say to the loved ones left behind when a person loses their life in service to our country. With the dedication of Alabama's first Gold Star Families Memorial Monument, the message is clear: "We will never forget."

The black granite monument designed by the Hershel Woody Williams Medal of Honor Foundation will be placed at the Huntsville-Madison County Veterans Memorial. It will be dedicated on October 17, 2020. The monument will have the words, "Gold Star Families Memorial Monument, a tribute to Gold Star Families and Relatives" inscribed on the surface. The other side of the monument will depict scenes unique to Alabama through panels using themes of Family, Patriot, Sacrifice, and Homeland. The centerpiece is a silhouette representing loved ones who lost their life serving our country.

The project is a joint effort of the Hershel Woody Williams Medal of Honor Foundation, the Alabama Gold Star Families Memorial Monument Committee, the Huntsville-Madison County Veterans' Memorial Foundation, and the city of Huntsville. Its primary sponsors are Mike and Christine Wicks and i3 - Integration Innovation Inc.

WHERE DID THE IDEA FOR GOLD STAR FAMILIES MEMORIAL MONUMENTS START?

In 2010, Hershel Williams formed the Hershel Woody Williams Medal of Honor Foundation. Its mission is to honor Gold Star Families by establishing monuments in communities throughout the United States. To date, 62 monuments have been placed, representing 48 states. There are 77 monuments in process.

WHERE DID THE TERM "GOLD STAR FAMILY" ORIGINATE?

During World War I, it was customary for military families to display service flags in their windows featuring a blue star for every immediate family member serving in the Armed Forces. The star's color would be changed to gold if the family lost a loved one in the war, hence the term "Gold Star Family."

GOLD STAR MOTHERS AND FAMILIES DAY

Since 1936, our nation has recognized the last Sunday of September as Gold Star Mother's Day. In 2011, the law was amended to include the recognition of



all Gold Star family members on this day. Gold Star Spouses' Day is April 5.

HOW MANY GOLD STAR FAMILIES ARE IN ALABAMA?

The exact number is difficult to calculate because the government does not

Retirement: Rising Costs and More Risk Increase Uncertainty

KEY FINDINGS FROM THIS 21 PAGE REPORT INCLUDE THE FOLLOWING:

- Saving early and continuously during working years is difficult for many workers. While organizations offer suggested retirement savings targets for each age, many workers may struggle to meet them, even if they have a desire to save.
- Workers face market timing, interest rate, and longevity risks when they approach retirement age. Any of these risks can derail carefully laid retirement plans and together they can make the prospect of retirement daunting.
- While older Americans are the most likely to own a home, the number of Americans age 65 and older who are cost-burdened by housing costs has increased as more seniors are carrying

- mortgage debt into retirement.
- Healthcare costs continue to rise for all Americans, but these costs are higher for older Americans, who are more likely to have multiple chronic health conditions. Furthermore, lower income seniors spend a greater proportion of their income on healthcare costs than their more affluent peers.
- Long-term care costs represent an increasing challenge for many older Americans as more senior citizens need long-term care every year. While it can be prohibitively expensive for those who require nursing home care for multiple years, the majority of seniors receiving long-term care will receive it at home or in a non-nursing facility. This need is projected to increase even more as the Baby Boomers continue retiring.
- Creative solutions exist to begin addressing these challenges. Washington State is pioneering a program to cover long-term care costs using a social insurance model. The private sector, aided by the passage of recent federal legislation, is working to create lifetime income options for retirees and expand access to workplace plans. Meanwhile, some experts have proposed allowing retirees to purchase annuities through Social Security. Finally, expanding Social Security benefits would have a broad impact as most seniors receive the majority of their income through the program.
