1 Section 2. (a) The appropriations provided for in 2 this act shall be paid from funds in the State Treasury to the credit of the Education Trust Fund, Alabama Peace Officers' 3 Standards and Training Fund, Impaired Drivers Trust Fund, 4 5 Driver Education and Training Fund, Special Education Catastrophic Fund, Public School Fund and other listed funds 6 7 and are hereby made for the support of public education in Alabama for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2023, and the 8 9 appropriations herein made shall be subject to the provisions, 10 terms, conditions and limitations of the Budget and Financial Control Act (Code of Alabama 1975, Sections 41-4-80 et seq.), 11 12 the provisions of the Budget Management Act of 1976 (Code of 13 Alabama 1975, Sections 41-19-1 et seq.), and shall be in the amounts hereinafter specified. 14

15 (b) Amounts shown hereinunder the columns "Earmarked 16 Funds" and "Appropriation Total" are as set forth for the 17 purpose of establishing amounts estimated to be available by programmatic area from sources other than those listed in 18 subsection (a) of this Section 2, in order, upon consideration 19 20 of such other funds so estimated to be available, to promote 21 the accountability for an efficient use of funds available, 22 and the same are hereby appropriated by the Legislature. 23 Provided, however, that regardless of the ending date of any 24 pay period which has been or may be established by the 25 Legislature for the payment of salaries of state employees, 26 the entire payment due shall be made from the fiscal year's 27 appropriation in which the pay date falls.

At least fifty percent of all professional learning requirements necessary to retain a valid Alabama teaching certificate shall be directly related to the knowledge and skills necessary to provide high quality instruction that leads to student development and academic growth. The State Superintendent shall establish an approval system, including, but not limited to a menu of micro credentials, that relates directly to any valid teaching certificate holders' responsibilities as an educator. The State Board of Education may adopt rules, as necessary, for initial or recertification criteria. Each college or university receiving an 11 12 appropriation from the Education Trust Fund in Section 3C that 13 operates a public teacher preparation program leading to the 14 attainment of an initial elementary teaching certification 15 shall be in compliance with the credit hour requirements of 16 reading or literacy coursework, or both, based on the science 17 of learning to read, including multisensory strategies in 18 foundation reading skills. All such programs shall fully 19 cooperate with the Alabama State Department of Education's 20 internal or external initiatives, such as the Barksdale 21 Reading Institute, that gauge compliance with the Literacy Act 22 to improve the preparation of classroom teachers. Any college 23 or university not in compliance with these provisions by 24 January 2, 2023, as determined by the State Superintendent of 25 Education, shall have their Education Trust Fund appropriation 26 in Section 3C reduced by \$1,000,000 or one-half of one

percent, whichever is greater. The State Superintendent of Education shall certify the list of non-compliant colleges or universities to the Finance Director, the Chair of the House Ways and Means-Education, the Chair of the Senate Finance and Taxation-Education Committee and the Legislative Fiscal Officer prior to any reduction in funding.

Section 5. (a) In addition to the appropriations 7 herein made, all gifts, grants, contributions, insurance 8 proceeds or entitlements, in excess of the amount carried in 9 10 this act, including grants by the Congress of the United States, municipalities or counties, to any department, 11 division, board, bureau, commission, agency, institution, 12 13 office or officer of the State of Alabama are hereby 14 appropriated and, in the event the same are recurring, are 15 reappropriated to such department, division, board, bureau, 16 commission, agency, institution, office or officer to be used 17 only for the purpose or purposes for which the grant or 18 contribution was or shall be made. Further, all state, county, municipal and educational entities are authorized to disburse 19 20 such sums as deemed necessary by mutual agreement between said 21 entities and the State of Alabama, Department of Examiners of 22 Public Accounts to partially defray the cost of auditing 23 services performed by said agency. All such sums are hereby 24 appropriated and reappropriated if necessary to the Department 25 of Examiners of Public Accounts for audit services, to be 26 expended through the fund established by Section 41-5A-22, Code of Alabama 1975. 27

(b) The State Superintendent of Education shall 1 2 encourage the Local Education Agencies to use federal stimulus funds provided by the Congress of the United States through 3 the Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief Fund for 4 5 one-time, non-recurring allowable expenses to address the 6 coronavirus pandemic in Alabama public schools. The 7 Superintendent shall periodically report to the Finance Director, Chairs of the Senate Finance and Taxation-Education 8 9 Committee, the House Ways and Means-Education Committee, and 10 the Legislative Fiscal Officer, regarding the planned and actual expenditures of these funds by the Local Education 11 12 Agencies.

13 (c) The Local Education Agencies shall expend no 14 less than \$100,000,000 of all federal stimulus funds provided 15 by the Congress of the United States to address the 16 coronavirus pandemic in Alabama public schools to implement 17 the safely opening schools program, to include, but not 18 limited to: screening, testing, isolation and quarantine of 19 students and school personnel with symptoms, in order to protect students, teachers, and support personnel for schools 20 21 to return to full-time in-person education. Local school 22 boards shall have the choice to utilize the funds for the 23 above purposes to the degree that meets their individual 24 needs.

25 Section 6. The State Superintendent of Education 26 shall make requisitions to the State Comptroller in favor of 27 the proper beneficiary in accordance with the law and rules and regulations governing the expenditure or disbursement of any and all funds appropriated to the State Department of Education and/or the State Board of Education in this act, whereupon the Comptroller shall issue her warrant therefor. All other appropriations in this act shall be paid after proper requisitions are made to the State Comptroller in the manner now provided by law.

Section 7. Nothing in this act shall be construed to 8 9 affect or repeal any law authorizing or permitting any 10 college, school or other education or eleemosynary institution of the State to receive, collect or disburse any fees, 11 tuitions, charges, sales, endowments, trusts or income 12 13 therefrom, which are now or may hereafter be authorized to receive, collect or disburse. The receiving college, school or 14 15 institution shall further maintain separate accounts for such receipts or shall maintain a system of accounting which will 16 show a cash flow of such receipts received under the provision 17 18 of this appropriation.

Section 8. The appropriations made herein to the 19 20 departments, boards, offices, commissions, and agencies 21 include the amounts necessary and said departments, boards, 22 offices, commissions, and agencies are hereby directed to make the transfer of funds to the State Personnel Department in the 23 24 amounts enumerated in the general appropriations act for the 25 fiscal year ending September 30, 2023. All agencies and institutions enumerated in this act that receive services from 26 27 other governmental agencies enumerated in this act or the

general appropriations act shall make full payment in a timely manner (as determined by the Department of Finance) for such services.

Section 9. All encumbered balances of a previous 4 5 fiscal year appropriation other than the exclusions authorized by the Code of Alabama 1975, Section 41-4-93, shall lapse no 6 7 later than September 30 of the fiscal year immediately following the fiscal year for which the appropriation was made 8 and shall revert to the credit of the Education Trust Fund or 9 10 earmarked fund from which the appropriation or appropriations were made. 11

Section 10. Upon certification to the Director of 12 13 Finance by the State Attorney General that a federal court has 14 ordered the State of Alabama to pay claims, attorney fees, or 15 other costs relating to said court order, funds are hereby appropriated to the affected department, board, bureau, or 16 17 commission in the amount necessary to satisfy that court 18 order. Such appropriations are in addition to any other appropriation heretofore or hereafter made in this 19 20 appropriation act. Such appropriations are conditioned upon 21 the availability of funds and a determination by the Director 22 of Finance that other current appropriations are not available 23 for court-ordered payments.

24 Section 11. Local boards of education may exercise 25 flexibility among line item expenditures, not to create a 26 reduction of earned teacher units and/or local board of 27 education support personnel. 1 Section 12. The State Superintendent of Education 2 may approve a request by a local board of education for 3 redirecting Other Current Expense funds designated for 4 pass-through calculations to their local Child Nutrition 5 Program if the redirected funds do not prevent the Child 6 Nutrition Program of that local board of education from 7 maintaining a one-month fund balance.

Section 13. The appropriations made herein to the 8 departments, boards, offices, commissions and agencies include 9 10 the amounts necessary to pay the State Employees' Insurance Board (SEIB). The SEIB rate shall be \$930 per month for each 11 full-time employee for the fiscal year ending September 30, 12 13 2023. The State Employees' Insurance Board will adjust the 14 insurance program wherever appropriate to maintain the 15 aforementioned fixed rate.

16 Section 14. Notwithstanding any other provisions of 17 this act or any other act, any amount from appropriations for 18 the fiscal year ending September 30, 2022 to the various state agencies and institutions in this act, including 19 appropriations from the Education Trust Fund, which are 20 21 unexpended and reverted on September 30, 2022 are hereby 22 reappropriated to the respective state agencies, offices and institutions for the fiscal year beginning October 1, 2022. 23

24 Section 15. (a) The At-Risk and High Hopes 25 appropriations made to the State Department of Education shall 26 be expended as follows: 50% shall be at the discretion of the 27 State Superintendent of Education and 50% shall be awarded in

the form of grants to school systems/entities for activities 1 2 or programs designed to enhance outcomes for At-Risk Students. At-Risk Students shall be defined as students who have not met 3 proficiency standards for state accountability assessments and 4 5 one or more of the following apply: the student attends a 6 Title I school; qualifies for free or reduced lunch; qualifies 7 for special education or Tier III intervention; or is an 8 English language learner. In the awarding of grants, 9 preference will be given to undertakings that will directly 10 impact student achievement and improve performance on state assessments to include remediation for students, after-school 11 and tutorial programs, career/technical programs, character 12 13 education, enrichment activities, programs that enhance 14 reading and mathematics abilities in students, activities that 15 increase grade-to-grade promotion, career and college 16 readiness and early warning and prevention programs. Programs 17 must employ evidence-based practices and measure student 18 growth and achievement using research-based norms and criterion. Funds should be awarded on a per-pupil basis, with 19 20 no more than ten percent of the grant award going toward 21 personnel costs.

(b) In an effort to provide the best and most
efficient implementation for intervention and innovation in
schools, administration of the grant awards shall be assigned
to the Alabama State Department of Education's Division of
Administrative and Financial Support with evaluative input
from other Alabama State Department of Education advisory

personnel, including the State Superintendent of Education, as 1 2 appropriate. The grant application process must require districts to submit plans to the Alabama State Department of 3 Education detailing their intended use of the grant funds with 4 5 regard to student proficiency and growth. Grants may be awarded any time after July 1st so schools can prepare for the 6 7 new school year. Notwithstanding the foregoing, the Alabama State Department of Education's Division of Administrative and 8 9 Financial Support shall make every reasonable effort to notify 10 grant recipients of awards by August 1, 2022. No funding will be available until October 1, 2022. Grantees will have no 11 guarantee of funding until October 1, 2022. 12

13 (c) Upon the awarding of any grant funds, the 14 Alabama State Department of Education must submit a report to 15 the Chairs of the House Ways and Means-Education Committee, the Senate Committee on Finance and Taxation-Education and the 16 17 Legislative Fiscal Officer that shall indicate the 18 grant-recipient districts and each district's plan for those funds. Those districts shall submit follow-up reports 19 20 indicating the results of those plans from the previous school 21 year by July 31, 2023.

22 Section 16. All nongovernmental entities, identified 23 by the Legislative Services Agency, which are allocated funds 24 in Section 3 of this act shall file a report with the Chair of 25 the House Ways and Means-Education Committee, the Chair of the 26 Senate Committee on Finance and Taxation-Education, the 27 Finance Director, and the Legislative Fiscal Officer regarding the proposed expenditures and usage of the funds appropriated
 in the fiscal year ending September 30, 2023.

Section 17. If any section, paragraph, sentence,
clause, provision or portion of this act or all or any portion
of the appropriations herein made is held unconstitutional or
invalid, it shall not affect any other section, paragraph,
sentence, clause, provision or portion of this act or any
other appropriation or appropriations or portion thereof
hereby made not in and of itself unconstitutional or invalid.

Section 18. All laws or parts of laws, general,
 special, private or local in conflict with or inconsistent
 with the provisions of this act are hereby expressly repealed.

Section 19. This act shall become effective onOctober 1, 2022.
