24	Section 1. There is hereby appropriated for the
25	support of public education in Alabama for the fiscal year
26	ending September 30, 2023, for debt service, and for capital
27	outlay to be paid out of funds specified in subsection (a) of

Section 2 of this act, the amounts specified in subsections 1 2 (a), (b), (c), (d), and (e) of Section 3 of this act, and Section 4 of this act. For the purpose specified in subsection 3 (b) of Section 2 of this act, amounts are shown by 4 5 programmatic area and the total for all programs is shown so as to include estimated sources of funds other than those 6 7 listed in subsection (a) of Section 2 of this act. For the purpose of this act, "ETF" shall mean the Education Trust Fund 8 9 and "Federal and Local Funds" shall mean all gifts, grants, 10 contributions, or entitlements, including grants by the Congress of the United States, municipalities or counties. 11

12 Section 2. (a) The appropriations provided for in 13 this act shall be paid from funds in the State Treasury to the credit of the Education Trust Fund, Alabama Peace Officers' 14 15 Standards and Training Fund, Impaired Drivers Trust Fund, Driver Education and Training Fund, Special Education 16 17 Catastrophic Fund, Public School Fund and other listed funds 18 and are hereby made for the support of public education in Alabama for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2023, and the 19 20 appropriations herein made shall be subject to the provisions, 21 terms, conditions and limitations of the Budget and Financial 22 Control Act (Code of Alabama 1975, Sections 41-4-80 et seq.), 23 the provisions of the Budget Management Act of 1976 (Code of 24 Alabama 1975, Sections 41-19-1 et seq.), and shall be in the 25 amounts hereinafter specified.

(b) Amounts shown hereinunder the columns "Earmarked
 Funds" and "Appropriation Total" are as set forth for the

purpose of establishing amounts estimated to be available by 1 2 programmatic area from sources other than those listed in subsection (a) of this Section 2, in order, upon consideration 3 of such other funds so estimated to be available, to promote 4 the accountability for an efficient use of funds available, 5 and the same are hereby appropriated by the Legislature. 6 7 Provided, however, that regardless of the ending date of any pay period which has been or may be established by the 8 Legislature for the payment of salaries of state employees, 9 10 the entire payment due shall be made from the fiscal year's 11 appropriation in which the pay date falls.

Upon certification and approval by the Deputy State Superintendent of the Office of Administrative and Financial Services that any newly formed city school system is an operational public school system within the State of Alabama, the Department shall ensure that any Foundation Program funds or other state funds allocated to the parent county board of education of the newly formed city school system for students that attended and were counted in the Average Daily Membership of the parent county board of education and now will attend the newly formed city school system shall be transferred to the newly formed city school system for operational expenses. The above appropriation shall be distributed by the State Board of Education in accordance with the provisions of Sections 16-13-230 through 16-13-239, Code of Alabama 1975, and all other laws and regulations of the State Board of Education relating to the expenditure of such funds. Any reductions made using flexibility of state units must comply with federal comparability and supplanting guidelines. Professional learning activities are sustained, intensive, collaborative, job-embedded, data-driven, and classroom-focused to provide educators with the knowledge and skills necessary to enable students to succeed and meet the challenging state academic standards. At least fifty percent of all professional learning requirements necessary to retain a valid Alabama teaching certificate shall be directly related to the knowledge and skills necessary to provide high quality instruction that leads to student development and academic growth. The State Superintendent shall establish an approval system, including, but not limited to a menu of micro credentials, that relates directly to any valid teaching certificate holders' responsibilities as an educator. The State Board of Education may adopt rules, as necessary, for initial or recertification criteria. Section 4. There is hereby appropriated \$125,000,000 2 3 from the Education Trust Fund to the Department of Finance to be distributed to all education entities that received an 4 allocation pursuant to Section 9 of Act 2020-167, the 2020 5 6 PSCA bond issue. Each eligible education entity shall receive 7 a pro rata share of the above appropriation that is equal to its pro rata share of bond proceeds allocated to it pursuant 8 to Section 9 of Act 2020-167. The Legislature recognizes that 9 construction costs have risen since the enactment of Act 10 11 2020-167. Therefore, education entities are authorized to 12 utilize the funds appropriated in this section toward the cost 13 of projects being funded by 2020 PSCA bond issue proceeds. Education entities are further authorized to use the funds 14 15 appropriated above for any other capital project, including 16 without limitation construction costs, costs of equipping facilities, and repairs and maintenance. The funds 17 18 appropriated in this section are one-time funding and shall 19 not be used to pay for ongoing annual expenditures.

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20 Section 5. Each college or university receiving an 21 appropriation from the Education Trust Fund in Section 3C that 22 operates a public teacher preparation program leading to the 23 attainment of an initial elementary teaching certification 24 shall be in compliance with the credit hour requirements of 25 reading or literacy coursework, or both, based on the science

of learning to read, including multisensory strategies in 1 2 foundation reading skills. All such programs shall fully cooperate with the Alabama State Department of Education's 3 internal or external initiatives, such as the Barksdale 4 5 Reading Institute, that gauge compliance with the Literacy Act 6 to improve the preparation of classroom teachers. Any college 7 or university not in compliance with these provisions by January 2, 2023, as determined by the State Superintendent of 8 9 Education, shall have their Education Trust Fund appropriation 10 in Section 3C reduced by \$1,000,000 or one-half of one percent, whichever is greater. The State Superintendent of 11 Education shall certify the list of non-compliant colleges or 12 13 universities to the Finance Director, the Chair of the House 14 Ways and Means-Education, the Chair of the Senate Finance and 15 Taxation-Education Committee and the Legislative Fiscal 16 Officer prior to any reduction in funding.

17 Section 6. (a) In addition to the appropriations 18 herein made, all gifts, grants, contributions, insurance proceeds or entitlements, in excess of the amount carried in 19 20 this act, including grants by the Congress of the United 21 States, municipalities or counties, to any department, 22 division, board, bureau, commission, agency, institution, office or officer of the State of Alabama are hereby 23 24 appropriated and, in the event the same are recurring, are 25 reappropriated to such department, division, board, bureau, commission, agency, institution, office or officer to be used 26 only for the purpose or purposes for which the grant or 27

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contribution was or shall be made. Further, all state, county, 1 2 municipal and educational entities are authorized to disburse such sums as deemed necessary by mutual agreement between said 3 entities and the State of Alabama, Department of Examiners of 4 5 Public Accounts to partially defray the cost of auditing services performed by said agency. All such sums are hereby 6 7 appropriated and reappropriated if necessary to the Department of Examiners of Public Accounts for audit services, to be 8 9 expended through the fund established by Section 41-5A-22, 10 Code of Alabama 1975.

(b) The State Superintendent of Education shall 11 encourage the Local Education Agencies to use federal stimulus 12 13 funds provided by the Congress of the United States through the Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief Fund for 14 15 one-time, non-recurring allowable expenses to address the coronavirus pandemic in Alabama public schools. The 16 Superintendent shall periodically report to the Finance 17 18 Director, Chairs of the Senate Finance and Taxation-Education Committee, the House Ways and Means-Education Committee, and 19 20 the Legislative Fiscal Officer, regarding the planned and 21 actual expenditures of these funds by the Local Education Agencies. 22

(c) The Local Education Agencies shall expend no
less than \$100,000,000 of all federal stimulus funds provided
by the Congress of the United States to address the
coronavirus pandemic in Alabama public schools to implement
the safely opening schools program, to include, but not

limited to: screening, testing, isolation and quarantine of students and school personnel with symptoms, in order to protect students, teachers, and support personnel for schools to return to full-time in-person education. Local school boards shall have the choice to utilize the funds for the above purposes to the degree that meets their individual needs.

Section 7. The State Superintendent of Education 8 9 shall make requisitions to the State Comptroller in favor of 10 the proper beneficiary in accordance with the law and rules and regulations governing the expenditure or disbursement of 11 12 any and all funds appropriated to the State Department of 13 Education and/or the State Board of Education in this act, 14 whereupon the Comptroller shall issue her warrant therefor. 15 All other appropriations in this act shall be paid after 16 proper requisitions are made to the State Comptroller in the 17 manner now provided by law.

18 Section 8. Nothing in this act shall be construed to 19 affect or repeal any law authorizing or permitting any 20 college, school or other education or eleemosynary institution 21 of the State to receive, collect or disburse any fees, 22 tuitions, charges, sales, endowments, trusts or income 23 therefrom, which are now or may hereafter be authorized to 24 receive, collect or disburse. The receiving college, school or 25 institution shall further maintain separate accounts for such receipts or shall maintain a system of accounting which will 26

show a cash flow of such receipts received under the provision
 of this appropriation.

Section 9. The appropriations made herein to the 3 departments, boards, offices, commissions, and agencies 4 5 include the amounts necessary and said departments, boards, offices, commissions, and agencies are hereby directed to make 6 7 the transfer of funds to the State Personnel Department in the 8 amounts enumerated in the general appropriations act for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2023. All agencies and 9 10 institutions enumerated in this act that receive services from other governmental agencies enumerated in this act or the 11 general appropriations act shall make full payment in a timely 12 13 manner (as determined by the Department of Finance) for such 14 services.

15 Section 10. All encumbered balances of a previous fiscal year appropriation other than the exclusions authorized 16 by the Code of Alabama 1975, Section 41-4-93, shall lapse no 17 18 later than September 30 of the fiscal year immediately following the fiscal year for which the appropriation was made 19 20 and shall revert to the credit of the Education Trust Fund or 21 earmarked fund from which the appropriation or appropriations 22 were made.

23 Section 11. Upon certification to the Director of 24 Finance by the State Attorney General that a federal court has 25 ordered the State of Alabama to pay claims, attorney fees, or 26 other costs relating to said court order, funds are hereby 27 appropriated to the affected department, board, bureau, or commission in the amount necessary to satisfy that court order. Such appropriations are in addition to any other appropriation heretofore or hereafter made in this appropriation act. Such appropriations are conditioned upon the availability of funds and a determination by the Director of Finance that other current appropriations are not available for court-ordered payments.

8 Section 12. Local boards of education may exercise 9 flexibility among line item expenditures, not to create a 10 reduction of earned teacher units and/or local board of 11 education support personnel.

12 Section 13. The State Superintendent of Education 13 may approve a request by a local board of education for 14 redirecting Other Current Expense funds designated for 15 pass-through calculations to their local Child Nutrition 16 Program if the redirected funds do not prevent the Child 17 Nutrition Program of that local board of education from 18 maintaining a one-month fund balance.

19 Section 14. The appropriations made herein to the departments, boards, offices, commissions and agencies include 20 21 the amounts necessary to pay the State Employees' Insurance 22 Board (SEIB). The SEIB rate shall be \$930 per month for each full-time employee for the fiscal year ending September 30, 23 24 2023. The State Employees' Insurance Board will adjust the 25 insurance program wherever appropriate to maintain the aforementioned fixed rate. 26

Section 15. Notwithstanding any other provisions of 1 2 this act or any other act, any amount from appropriations for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2022 to the various state 3 agencies and institutions in this act, including 4 5 appropriations from the Education Trust Fund, which are unexpended and reverted on September 30, 2022 are hereby 6 7 reappropriated to the respective state agencies, offices and institutions for the fiscal year beginning October 1, 2022. 8

Section 16. (a) The At-Risk and High Hopes 9 10 appropriations made to the State Department of Education shall be expended as follows: 50% shall be at the discretion of the 11 State Superintendent of Education and 50% shall be awarded in 12 13 the form of grants to school systems/entities for activities 14 or programs designed to enhance outcomes for At-Risk Students. 15 At-Risk Students shall be defined as students who have not met 16 proficiency standards for state accountability assessments and 17 one or more of the following apply: the student attends a 18 Title I school; qualifies for free or reduced lunch; qualifies for special education or Tier III intervention; or is an 19 20 English language learner. In the awarding of grants, 21 preference will be given to undertakings that will directly 22 impact student achievement and improve performance on state assessments to include remediation for students, after-school 23 24 and tutorial programs, career/technical programs, character 25 education, enrichment activities, programs that enhance 26 reading and mathematics abilities in students, activities that increase grade-to-grade promotion, career and college 27

readiness and early warning and prevention programs. Programs must employ evidence-based practices and measure student growth and achievement using research-based norms and criterion. Funds should be awarded on a per-pupil basis, with no more than ten percent of the grant award going toward personnel costs.

7 (b) In an effort to provide the best and most efficient implementation for intervention and innovation in 8 9 schools, administration of the grant awards shall be assigned 10 to the Alabama State Department of Education's Division of Administrative and Financial Support with evaluative input 11 from other Alabama State Department of Education advisory 12 13 personnel, including the State Superintendent of Education, as 14 appropriate. The grant application process must require 15 districts to submit plans to the Alabama State Department of 16 Education detailing their intended use of the grant funds with 17 regard to student proficiency and growth. Grants may be 18 awarded any time after July 1st so schools can prepare for the 19 new school year. Notwithstanding the foregoing, the Alabama 20 State Department of Education's Division of Administrative and 21 Financial Support shall make every reasonable effort to notify 22 grant recipients of awards by August 1, 2022. No funding will be available until October 1, 2022. Grantees will have no 23 24 guarantee of funding until October 1, 2022.

(c) Upon the awarding of any grant funds, the
Alabama State Department of Education must submit a report to
the Chairs of the House Ways and Means-Education Committee,

the Senate Committee on Finance and Taxation-Education and the Legislative Fiscal Officer that shall indicate the grant-recipient districts and each district's plan for those funds. Those districts shall submit follow-up reports indicating the results of those plans from the previous school year by July 31, 2023.

7 Section 17. All nongovernmental entities, identified by the Legislative Services Agency, which are allocated funds 8 9 in Section 3 of this act shall file a report with the Chair of 10 the House Ways and Means-Education Committee, the Chair of the Senate Committee on Finance and Taxation-Education, the 11 Finance Director, and the Legislative Fiscal Officer regarding 12 13 the proposed expenditures and usage of the funds appropriated 14 in the fiscal year ending September 30, 2023.

15 Section 18. If any section, paragraph, sentence, 16 clause, provision or portion of this act or all or any portion 17 of the appropriations herein made is held unconstitutional or 18 invalid, it shall not affect any other section, paragraph, 19 sentence, clause, provision or portion of this act or any 20 other appropriation or appropriations or portion thereof 21 hereby made not in and of itself unconstitutional or invalid.

22 Section 19. All laws or parts of laws, general, 23 special, private or local in conflict with or inconsistent 24 with the provisions of this act are hereby expressly repealed.

25 Section 20. This act shall become effective on 26 October 1, 2022.
