1 act. For the purpose of this act, "ETF" shall mean the 2 Education Trust Fund and "Federal and Local Funds" shall mean 3 all gifts, grants, contributions, or entitlements, including 4 grants by the Congress of the United States, municipalities or 5 counties.

(a) The appropriations provided for in 7 this act shall be paid from funds in the State Treasury to the credit of the Education Trust Fund, Alabama Peace Officers' 8 Standards and Training Fund, Impaired Drivers Trust Fund, 9 10 Driver Education and Training Fund, Special Education Catastrophic Fund, Public School Fund and other listed funds 11 12 and are hereby made for the support of public education in 13 Alabama for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2020, and the 14 appropriations herein made shall be subject to the provisions, 15 terms, conditions and limitations of the Budget and Financial Control Act (Code of Alabama 1975, Sections 41-4-80 et seq.), 16 17 the provisions of the Budget Management Act of 1976 (Code of 18 Alabama 1975, Sections 41-19-1 et seq.), and shall be in the amounts hereinafter specified. 19

Administrative and Financial Services that any newly formed city school system is an operational public school system within the State of Alabama, the Department shall ensure that any Foundation Program funds or other state funds allocated to the parent county board of education of the newly formed city school system for students that attended and were counted in the Average Daily Membership of the parent county board of education and now will attend the newly formed city school system shall be transferred to the newly formed city school system for operational expenses. Units earned under the Foundation Program shall be employed as regular classroom teachers and assigned by the local board of education. The divisors listed below shall not serve to prescribe pupil-teacher ratios. It is the intent of the Legislature that local boards of education have flexibility in determining where reductions are made. Any reductions made using flexibility of state units must comply with federal comparability and supplanting guidelines. Each district will submit an application for approval by the State Superintendent as to the unit allocation adjustments requested.

Notwithstanding Section 16-13-231.1(d), Code of Alabama 1975, there shall not be an appropriation for the 1% over the total cost of instructional salaries for the Foundation Program as calculated by the State Minimum Salary Schedule for the fiscal year beginning October 1, 2019. For "Fringe Benefits" the rate per day for two personal days and five sick days (for units earned in the Foundation Program) shall be \$80. The Teachers' Retirement System employer rate shall be 12.43% of salaries for Tier I members and 11.34% of salaries for Tier II members. The Public Education Employees' Health Insurance Program (PEEHIP) rate shall be \$800 per month for each full-time employee. As funds are appropriated, the appropriation herein shall include funds to pay for substitute support employees for each day a support employee is absent.

For "Classroom Instructional Support," the uniform amounts used in determining the Foundation Program allowance for classroom instructional support shall be: (1) textbooks or digital resources at \$75.00 per pupil in average daily membership during the first 20 scholastic days after Labor Day of the preceding school year; (2) classroom materials and supplies at \$600.00 per unit earned in the Foundation Program; (3) technology at \$350.00 per unit earned in the Foundation Program; (4) professional development at \$100.00 per unit earned in the Foundation Program; and (5) library enhancement at \$157.72 per unit earned in the Foundation Program. Funds allocated for instructional support units to meet Advanced Education standards may be used for principals, assistant principals, counselors, and librarians as calculated by the State Department of Education and assigned to the schools where such units are earned. An instructional support unit earned for a principal shall be increased by .31 for elementary schools, .35 for middle schools, and .45 for secondary schools and unit schools. An instructional support unit earned for an assistant principal shall be increased by .10 for elementary schools, middle schools, secondary schools and unit schools. An instructional support unit earned for a counselor shall be increased by .03 for secondary schools and unit schools. The budgeting and expenditure of funds in the Foundation Program at the local level shall be determined and made by the local board of education in accordance with rules and regulations of the State Board of Education and all laws governing such school budgets and expenditures.

Section 4. In addition to the appropriations herein 2 3 made, all gifts, grants, contributions, insurance proceeds or entitlements, in excess of the amount carried in this act, 4 including grants by the Congress of the United States, 5 municipalities or counties, to any department, division, 6 board, bureau, commission, agency, institution, office or 7 officer of the State of Alabama are hereby appropriated and, 8 9 in the event the same are recurring, are reappropriated to such department, division, board, bureau, commission, agency, 10 11 institution, office or officer to be used only for the purpose 12 or purposes for which the grant or contribution was or shall 13 be made. Further, all state, county, municipal and educational entities are authorized to disburse such sums as deemed 14 15 necessary by mutual agreement between said entities and the 16 State of Alabama, Department of Examiners of Public Accounts 17 to partially defray the cost of auditing services performed by 18 said agency. All such sums are hereby appropriated and 19 reappropriated if necessary to the Department of Examiners of 20 Public Accounts for audit services, to be expended through the 21 fund established by Section 41-5-24, Code of Alabama 1975.

22 Section 5. The State Superintendent of Education 23 shall make requisitions to the State Comptroller in favor of 24 the proper beneficiary in accordance with the law and rules and regulations governing the expenditure or disbursement of any and all funds appropriated to the State Department of Education and/or the State Board of Education in this act, whereupon the Comptroller shall issue his warrant therefor. All other appropriations in this act shall be paid after proper requisitions are made to the State Comptroller in the manner now provided by law.

Section 6. Nothing in this act shall be construed to 8 9 affect or repeal any law authorizing or permitting any 10 college, school or other education or eleemosynary institution of the State to receive, collect or disburse any fees, 11 tuitions, charges, sales, endowments, trusts or income 12 13 therefrom, which are now or may hereafter be authorized to receive, collect or disburse. The receiving college, school or 14 15 institution shall further maintain separate accounts for such receipts or shall maintain a system of accounting which will 16 17 show a cash flow of such receipts received under the provision 18 of this appropriation.

Section 7. The appropriations made herein to the 19 20 departments, boards, offices, commissions, and agencies 21 include the amounts necessary and said departments, boards, 22 offices, commissions, and agencies are hereby directed to make the transfer of funds to the State Personnel Department in the 23 24 amounts enumerated in the general appropriations act for the 25 fiscal year ending September 30, 2020. All agencies and institutions enumerated in this act that receive services from 26 27 other governmental agencies enumerated in this act or the

general appropriations act shall make full payment in a timely manner (as determined by the Department of Finance) for such services.

Section 8. All encumbered balances of a previous 4 5 fiscal year appropriation other than the exclusions authorized by the Code of Alabama 1975, Section 41-4-93, shall lapse no 6 7 later than September 30 of the fiscal year immediately following the fiscal year for which the appropriation was made 8 and shall revert to the credit of the Education Trust Fund or 9 10 earmarked fund from which the appropriation or appropriations were made. 11

Section 9. Upon certification to the Director of 12 13 Finance by the State Attorney General that a federal court has ordered the State of Alabama to pay claims, attorney fees, or 14 15 other costs relating to said court order, funds are hereby appropriated to the affected department, board, bureau, or 16 17 commission in the amount necessary to satisfy that court 18 order. Such appropriations are in addition to any other appropriation heretofore or hereafter made in this 19 20 appropriation act. Such appropriations are conditioned upon 21 the availability of funds and a determination by the Director 22 of Finance that other current appropriations are not available 23 for court-ordered payments.

24 Section 10. Local boards of education may exercise 25 flexibility among line item expenditures, not to create a 26 reduction of earned teacher units and/or local board of 27 education support personnel. Section 11. The State Superintendent of Education may approve a request by a local board of education for redirecting Other Current Expense funds designated for pass-through calculations to their local Child Nutrition Program if the redirected funds do not prevent the Child Nutrition Program of that local board of education from maintaining a one-month fund balance.

Section 12. The appropriations made herein to the 8 departments, boards, offices, commissions and agencies include 9 10 the amounts necessary to pay the State Employees' Insurance Board (SEIB). The SEIB rate shall be \$930 per month for each 11 full-time employee for the fiscal year ending September 30, 12 13 2020. The State Employees' Insurance Board will adjust the 14 insurance program wherever appropriate to maintain the 15 aforementioned fixed rate.

16 Section 13. Notwithstanding any other provisions of this act or any other act, any amount from appropriations for 17 18 the fiscal year ending September 30, 2019 to the various state agencies and institutions in this act, except appropriations 19 20 from the Education Trust Fund, which are unexpended and 21 reverted on September 30, 2019 are hereby reappropriated to 22 the respective state agencies, offices and institutions for the fiscal year beginning October 1, 2019. 23

24 Section 14. (a) The At-Risk and High Hopes 25 appropriations made to the State Department of Education shall 26 be expended as follows: 50% shall be at the discretion of the 27 State Superintendent of Education and 50% shall be awarded in

the form of grants to school systems/entities for activities 1 2 or programs designed to enhance outcomes for At-Risk Students. At-Risk Students shall be defined as students who have not met 3 proficiency standards for state accountability assessments and 4 5 one or more of the following apply: the student attends a 6 Title I school; qualifies for free or reduced lunch; qualifies 7 for special education or Tier III intervention; or is an 8 English language learner. In the awarding of grants, 9 preference will be given to undertakings that will directly 10 impact student achievement and improve performance on state assessments to include remediation for students, after-school 11 and tutorial programs, career/technical programs, character 12 13 education, enrichment activities, programs that enhance 14 reading and mathematics abilities in students, activities that 15 increase grade-to-grade promotion, career and college 16 readiness and early warning and prevention programs. Programs 17 must employ evidence-based practices and measure student 18 growth and achievement using research-based norms and 19 criterion. Funds should be awarded on a per-pupil basis, with 20 no more than ten percent of the grant award going toward 21 personnel costs.

(b) In an effort to provide the best and most
efficient implementation for intervention and innovation in
schools, administration of the grant awards shall be assigned
to the Alabama State Department of Education's Division of
Administrative and Financial Support with evaluative input
from other Alabama State Department of Education advisory

personnel, including the State Superintendent of Education, as 1 2 appropriate. The grant application process must require districts to submit plans to the Alabama State Department of 3 Education detailing their intended use of the grant funds with 4 5 regard to student proficiency and growth. Grants may be awarded any time after July 1st so schools can prepare for the 6 7 new school year. Notwithstanding the foregoing, the Alabama State Department of Education's Division of Administrative and 8 9 Financial Support shall make every reasonable effort to notify 10 grant recipients of awards by August 1, 2019. No funding will be available until October 1, 2019. Grantees will have no 11 guarantee of funding until October 1, 2019. 12

13 (c) Upon the awarding of any grant funds, the 14 Alabama State Department of Education must submit a report to 15 the Chairs of the House Ways and Means-Education Committee and 16 the Senate Committee on Finance and Taxation-Education and the Director of the Legislative Services Agency, that shall 17 18 indicate the grant-recipient districts and each district's plan for those funds. Those districts shall submit follow-up 19 reports indicating the results of those plans from the 20 21 previous school year by July 31, 2020.

22 Section 15. (a) All nongovernmental entities, 23 identified by the Legislative Services Agency, which are 24 allocated funds in Section 3 of this act shall file a report 25 with the Chairs of the House Ways and Means-Education 26 Committee, the Senate Committee on Finance and 27 Taxation-Education, and the Director of the Legislative Services Agency on or before November 1, 2019 regarding the
 proposed expenditures and usage of the funds appropriated in
 the fiscal year ending September 30, 2020.

4 (b) The reports shall include a detailed service
5 inventory pursuant to guidelines provided by the Legislative
6 Services Agency.

(c) In the event that the entity was also allocated
funds pursuant to Act 2018-481, the entity shall also include
in its report a detailed inventory of the services delivered
for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2019 pursuant to
guidelines provided by the Legislative Services Agency.

12 Section 16. If any section, paragraph, sentence, 13 clause, provision or portion of this act or all or any portion 14 of the appropriations herein made is held unconstitutional or 15 invalid, it shall not affect any other section, paragraph, 16 sentence, clause, provision or portion of this act or any 17 other appropriation or appropriations or portion thereof 18 hereby made not in and of itself unconstitutional or invalid.

Section 17. All laws or parts of laws, general,
 special, private or local in conflict with or inconsistent
 with the provisions of this act are hereby expressly repealed.

22 Section 18. The Legislature hereby finds that, 23 pursuant to the Education Trust Fund Rolling Reserve Act, 24 appropriations from the Education Trust Fund shall not exceed 25 the fiscal year appropriations cap. The Education Trust Fund 26 fiscal year appropriations cap for fiscal year 2020 is 27 \$7,125,895,252. The total amount of Education Trust Fund

appropriations in this act and other appropriation acts for 1 2 fiscal year 2020 are equal to the Education Trust Fund appropriations cap amount. Prior to fiscal year 2013 when the 3 Education Trust Fund Rolling Reserve Act became effective, 4 5 conditional appropriations were periodically granted from the Education Trust Fund subject to the availability of funds in 6 7 the Education Trust Fund, the recommendation of the Director of Finance, and the approval of the Governor; however, a 8 9 conditional appropriation is no longer allowed under the 10 provisions of the Rolling Reserve Act if it would make the total Education Trust Fund appropriations exceed the 11 appropriations cap. Therefore, a conditional appropriation 12 13 from the Education Trust Fund for fiscal year 2020 could not 14 be released.

15 Section 19. This act shall become effective on16 October 1, 2019.
